PRELIMINARY RECITALS

Pursuant to a petition filed April 29, 2013, under Wis. Stat. § 49.45(5), and Wis. Admin. Code § HA 3.03(1), to review a decision by the Milwaukee Enrollment Services/Wisconsin Disability Determination Bureau (DDB or Bureau) in regard to Medical Assistance (MA), a hearing was held on June 13, 2013, by telephone.

The issue for determination is whether petitioner is disabled for MA purposes.

FINDINGS OF FACT

1. Petitioner is a resident of Milwaukee County.
2. Petitioner applied for MA on January 21, 2013. By letter dated April 19, 2013, the Bureau found that petitioner was not disabled. Petitioner sought reconsideration, but the Bureau affirmed its determination on May 21, 2013.

3. Prior to or concurrently with the MA application, petitioner also applied for Social Security disability benefits and Supplemental Security Income (SSI). Those benefits were denied on April 16, 2013, with findings of no disability.
4. The petitioner does not allege any new medical impairment in addition to the impairments considered in the Social Security decision. He alleged a worsening of an impairment considered in the Social Security decision -- his colorectal cancer. Specifically, in May 2013, his physician stated that carcinoma was present in five of fourteen lymph nodes tested. As of June 17, 2013, his physician advised that the petitioner would require chemotherapy for the next four months.
5. This Administrative Law Judge forwarded the petitioner's documentation of the information in Finding #5 to the DDB, for additional consideration by the reviewer of the petitioner's MA disability case (and probably his Social Security case). On July 29, 2013, the reviewer responded that the petitioner continues to not be sufficiently disabled, because it has not been proven that he will be unable to do any type of work for at least one year from the onset of his disabling condition (December 2012).

DISCUSSION

A person between ages 18 and 65, with no minor children, must be blind or disabled to be eligible for MA. A finding of disability must be in accordance with federal social security/SSI standards. See Wis. Stat. § 49.47(4)(a)4. Because the standards are the same, a finding of no disability for Social Security/SSI purposes made within 12 months of the MA application is binding on a State Medicaid (MA) agency. Exceptions may occur only if certain conditions exist such as allegations of a different disabling condition or changes in the previously considered conditions. None of the exceptions apply here. See 42 C.F.R. § 435.541(a); see also U.S. Department of Health and Human Services commentary, 54 Fed. Reg. 236 (1989).

Because petitioner has been denied Social Security/SSI following a finding of no disability, I must conclude that petitioner is not eligible for MA.

Hopefully, the petitioner's condition will not worsen; but if it does, he may re-apply for Medicaid as a disabled person at any time. Also, beginning in October 2013, the "Obamacare" exchange will be available for the purchase of private insurance (effective 1/1/14), at www.healthcare.gov. A person cannot be barred from buying such insurance due to a pre-existing condition. A person with income below 400% of the federal poverty level will receive a subsidy to offset a portion of the premium cost. The current federal poverty level for one person is \$11,170 (100%) annually, \$1,862 (200%) monthly, \$2,793 (300%) monthly, and 100% FPL for two persons is \$15,130 annually.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

Petitioner is not disabled as that term is used for MA purposes pursuant to Wis. Stat. § 49.47(4).

THEREFORE, it is

ORDERED

That the petition for review is dismissed.

REQUEST FOR A REHEARING

This is a final administrative decision. If you think this decision is based on a serious mistake in the facts or the law, you may request a rehearing. You may also ask for a rehearing if you have found new evidence which would change the decision. Your request must explain what mistake the Administrative

Law Judge made and why it is important or you must describe your new evidence and tell why you did not have it at your first hearing. If you do not explain these things, your request will have to be denied.

To ask for a rehearing, send a written request to the Division of Hearings and Appeals, P.O. Box 7875, Madison, WI 53707-7875. Send a copy of your request to the other people named in this decision as "PARTIES IN INTEREST." Your request for a rehearing must be received no later than 20 days after the date of the decision. Late requests cannot be granted.

The process for asking for a rehearing is in Wis. Stat. § 227.49. A copy of the statutes can be found at your local library or courthouse.

APPEAL TO COURT

You may also appeal this decision to Circuit Court in the county where you live. Appeals must be served and filed with the appropriate court no more than 30 days after the date of this hearing decision (or 30 days after a denial of rehearing, if you ask for one).

For purposes of appeal to circuit court, the Respondent in this matter is the Department of Health Services. After filing the appeal with the appropriate court, it must be served on the Secretary of that Department, either personally or by certified mail. The address of the Department is: 1 West Wilson Street, Madison, Wisconsin 53703. A copy should also be sent to the Division of Hearings and Appeals, 5005 University Avenue, Suite 201, Madison, WI 53705-5400.

The appeal must also be served on the other "PARTIES IN INTEREST" named in this decision. The process for appeals to the Circuit Court is in Wis. Stat. §§ 227.52 and 227.53.
