PRELIMINARY RECITALS

Pursuant to a petition filed August 6, 2013, under Wis. Admin. Code, §HA 3.03(1), to review a decision by the Outagamie County Dept. of Human Services to discontinue FoodShare benefits (FS), a hearing was held on September 17, 2013, by telephone.

The issue for determination is whether the county correctly budgeted the income of a household member.

FINDINGS OF FACT

1. Petitioner (CARES # [REDACTED]) is a resident of Outagamie County.
2. Petitioner received FS for herself and three children. In May, 2013, she reported that she had moved in with the father of her youngest child. The county eventually obtained the father's income information, and it found that the now five-person household was over the FS income limit.

3. The county informed petitioner that FS were closed effective July 1, 2013.

DISCUSSION

The federal FS regulations define FS household composition as follows:

(a) *General household definition.* A household is composed of one of the following individuals or groups of individuals, unless otherwise specified in paragraph (b) of this section:

1. An individual living alone;
2. An individual living with others, but customarily purchasing food and preparing meals for home consumption separate and apart from others; or
3. A group of individuals who live together and customarily purchase food and prepare meals together for home consumption.

7 C.F.R. §273.1(a). FS rules provide further as follows:

The following individuals who live with others must be considered as customarily purchasing food and preparing meals with the others, even if they do not do so, and thus must be included in the same household, unless otherwise specified.

- (i) Spouses;
- (ii) A person under 22 years of age who is living with his or her natural or adoptive parent(s) or step-parent(s); and
- (iii) A child (other than a foster child) under 18 years of age who lives with and is under the parental control of a household member other than his or her parent.

7 C.F.R. §273.1(b)(1); see also FS Handbook, Appendix 3.3.1.2.

Under the federal law, petitioner’s son must be included with his father because he lives in the same household with his father. However, he must also be included with his mother because he lives in her household. Thus the federal law requires the entire five-person household to be one FS unit even though there is no relationship between the father and the two older children.

Petitioner did not dispute the income calculations. I thus will conclude that the county correctly discontinued petitioner’s FS.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The father of petitioner’s youngest child has to be included in her FS household because the child lives with both of them.

THEREFORE, it is ORDERED

That the petition for review herein be and the same is hereby dismissed.

REQUEST FOR A REHEARING

This is a final administrative decision. If you think this decision is based on a serious mistake in the facts or the law, you may request a rehearing. You may also ask for a rehearing if you have found new evidence which would change the decision. Your request must explain what mistake the Administrative

Law Judge made and why it is important or you must describe your new evidence and tell why you did not have it at your first hearing. If you do not explain these things, your request will have to be denied.

To ask for a rehearing, send a written request to the Division of Hearings and Appeals, P.O. Box 7875, Madison, WI 53707-7875. Send a copy of your request to the other people named in this decision as "PARTIES IN INTEREST." Your request for a rehearing must be received no later than 20 days after the date of the decision. Late requests cannot be granted.

The process for asking for a rehearing is in Wis. Stat. § 227.49. A copy of the statutes can be found at your local library or courthouse.

APPEAL TO COURT


You may also appeal this decision to Circuit Court in the county where you live. Appeals must be served and filed with the appropriate court no more than 30 days after the date of this hearing decision (or 30 days after a denial of rehearing, if you ask for one).

For purposes of appeal to circuit court, the Respondent in this matter is the Department of Health Services. After filing the appeal with the appropriate court, it must be served on the Secretary of that Department, either personally or by certified mail. The address of the Department is: 1 West Wilson Street, Madison, Wisconsin 53703. A copy should also be sent to the Division of Hearings and Appeals, 5005 University Avenue, Suite 201, Madison, WI 53705-5400.

The appeal must also be served on the other "PARTIES IN INTEREST" named in this decision. The process for appeals to the Circuit Court is in Wis. Stat. §§ 227.52 and 227.53.
